## NOTICE OF FILING, PUBLIC HEARING, AND PROCEDURAL CONFERENCE

D.P.U. 17-GSEP-03 November 13, 2017

Petition of Boston Gas Company and Colonial Gas Company, each d/b/a National Grid for Approval of 2018 Gas System Enhancement Plans, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 145, and for rates effective May 1, 2018.

On October 31, 2017, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas") and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"), each doing business as National Grid (collectively, "Companies"), submitted to the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") their 2018 gas system enhancement plans ("GSEPs") to replace aging natural gas pipeline infrastructure. Boston Gas and Colonial Gas seek approval to collect \$73,912,313 and \$13,334,303, respectively, through the gas system enhancement adjustment factor ("GSEAF") to recover the cumulative cost to replace eligible leak-prone infrastructure through the end of calendar year 2018. The proposed GSEAF collections include estimated environmentally significant grade 3 leak replacement costs of \$1,484,700 for Boston Gas and \$63,060 for Colonial Gas, pursuant to St. 2016, c. 188, §13. In addition, Boston Gas states that its actual 2018 revenue requirement of \$72,427,613 exceeds the 1.5 percent revenue cap by \$14,379,993, and seeks a waiver of the cap. Colonial Gas states that its actual 2018 revenue requirement of \$13,271,243 exceeds the 1.5 percent revenue cap by \$2,392,193, and seeks a waiver of the cap. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 17-GSEP-03.

According to the Companies, their proposed 2018 GSEPs are consistent with the requirements of G.L. c. 164, § 145, which allows gas distribution companies to accelerate the replacement of eligible infrastructure in order to improve public safety or infrastructure reliability, and to reduce or potentially reduce lost and unaccounted for natural gas. Boston Gas states that approval of the GSEAF will result in a monthly bill increase of \$4.62 or 2.5 percent for the average residential heating customer using 123 therms per month during winter months, and a monthly bill increase of \$0.98 or 2.8 percent for the average residential heating customer using 26 therms per month during summer months. Colonial Gas states that approval of the GSEAF will result in a monthly bill increase of \$2.91 or 1.9 percent for the average residential heating customer using 105 therms per month during winter months, and a monthly bill increase of \$0.68 or 2.1 percent for the average residential heating customer using 24 therms per month during summer months. Pursuant to

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G.L. c. 164, § 145, on May 1, 2019, the Companies will submit to the Department the amounts recovered through the GSEAF for reconciliation with actual calendar year 2018 GSEP costs. Boston Gas proposes that the following rates for each customer class take effect on May 1, 2018:

Residential	\$0.0848 per therm
Small Commercial and Industrial ("C&I")	\$0.0732 per therm
Medium C&I	\$0.0644 per therm
Large C&I	\$0.0580 per therm
Extra Large C&I	\$0.0493 per therm

Colonial Gas proposes that the following rates for each customer class take effect on May 1, 2018:

Residential	\$0.0655 per therm
Small C&I	\$0.0495 per therm
Medium C&I	\$0.0362 per therm
Large C&I	\$0.0178 per therm

The Department will conduct a public hearing to receive comments on the Companies' petition. The hearing will take place on Wednesday, December 6, 2017, at 2:00 p.m., at the Department's offices, One South Station – 5th Floor, Boston, Massachusetts 02110. A procedural conference will take place immediately following the public hearing. Any person who desires to comment may do so at the time and place noted above, or submit written comments to the Department not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on Wednesday, December 6, 2017.

Any person who desires to participate in the evidentiary phase of this proceeding must file a written petition for leave to intervene with the Department not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **Wednesday, December 6, 2017**. A petition for leave to intervene must satisfy the timing and substantive requirements of 220 C.M.R. § 1.03. Receipt by the Department, not mailing, constitutes filing and determines whether a petition has been timely filed. A petition filed late may be disallowed as untimely, unless good cause is shown for waiver under 220 C.M.R. § 1.01(4). To be allowed, a petition under 220 C.M.R. § 1.03(1) must satisfy the standing requirements of G.L. c. 30A, § 10. All responses to petitions to intervene must be filed by the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on the second business day after the petition to intervene was filed.

An original and one (1) copy of all written comments or petitions to intervene must be filed with Mark D. Marini, Secretary, Department of Public Utilities, One South Station – 5th Floor, Boston, Massachusetts 02110 not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on

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the dates noted above. One copy of all written comments or petitions to intervene should also be sent to the Companies' attorney, Andrea Keeffe, Esq., National Grid, 40 Sylvan Road, Waltham, Massachusetts, 02451.

The text of the e-mail or CD-ROM must specify: (1) the docket number of the proceeding, D.P.U. 17-GSEP-03; (2) the name of the person or company submitting the filing; and (3) a brief descriptive title of the document. The electronic filing should also include the name, title, and telephone number of a person to contact in the event of questions about the filing.
