NOTICE OF FILING, PUBLIC HEARING, AND PROCEDURAL CONFERENCE

D.P.U. 19-GREC-03

May 13, 2019

Petition of Boston Gas Company and Colonial Gas Company d/b/a National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 145, for review and approval of the reconciliation of its 2018 Gas System Enhancement Plan and for review and approval of its Gas System Enhancement Reconciliation Adjustment Factor.

On May 1, 2019, Boston Gas Company and Colonial Gas Company d/b/a National Grid (“National Grid” or “Companies”) submitted to the Department of Public Utilities (“Department”) a reconciliation of its 2018 gas system enhancement plan (“GSEP”) to replace aging natural gas pipeline infrastructure. Based on the Companies’ reconciliations, Boston Gas Company proposes to collect \$987,545 from ratepayers that it under-recovered and Colonial Gas Company proposes to refund \$1,352,220 to ratepayers that it over-recovered from ratepayers through the gas system enhancement reconciliation adjustment factors (“GSERAFs”) from November 1, 2019 to October 31, 2020. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 19-GREC-03.

Boston Gas Company proposes the following GSERAFs by rate sector:

Colonial Gas Company proposes the following GSERAFs by rate sector:

Boston Gas Company states that approval of the GSERAF will result in an average monthly bill increase of \$0.12, or 0.1 percent, for the average residential heating customer using 128 therms per month during winter months, and an average monthly bill increase of \$0.02, or 0.1 percent, for the average residential heating customer using 26 therms per month during summer months. Colonial Gas Company states that approval of the GSERAF will result in an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.67, or 0.4 percent, for the average residential heating customer using 112 therms per month during winter months, and an average monthly bill increase of \$0.15, or 0.4 percent, for the average residential heating customer using 25 therms per month during summer months.

The Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (“Attorney General”) filed a notice to intervene in this matter pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(a). Further, pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the Attorney General filed a notice of intent to retain experts and consultants to assist in her investigation of the Companies’ filing, and has requested Department approval to spend up to \$150,000 in this regard. Pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the costs incurred by the Attorney General relative to her retention of experts and consultants may be recovered in the Companies’ rates. Any person who desires to comment on the Attorney General’s notice of intent to retain experts and consultants in this matter may submit written comments to the Department not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **Wednesday, May 29, 2019**.

The Department will conduct a public hearing to receive comments on the Companies’ petition. The hearing will take place on **Wednesday, June 5, 2019, at 2:00 p.m.**, at the Department’s offices, One South Station, 5th Floor, Boston, Massachusetts 02110. A procedural conference will take place immediately following the public hearing to establish a schedule for the evidentiary phase of this case. Any person who desires to comment on the Companies’ petition may do so at the time and place noted above, or submit written comments to the Department not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **Wednesday, June 5, 2019**.

Any person who desires to participate in the evidentiary phase of this proceeding must file a written petition for leave to intervene with the Department not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **Wednesday, May 29, 2019**. A petition for leave to intervene must satisfy the timing and substantive requirements of 220 CMR 1.03. Receipt by the Department, not mailing, constitutes filing and determines whether a petition has been timely filed. A petition filed late may be disallowed as untimely, unless good cause is shown for waiver under 220 CMR 1.01(4). To be allowed, a petition under 220 CMR 1.03(1) must satisfy the standing requirements of G.L. c. 30A, § 10. All responses to petitions to intervene must be filed by the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on the second business day after the petition to intervene was filed.

An original and one (1) copy of all written comments or petitions to intervene must be filed with Mark D. Marini, Secretary, Department of Public Utilities, One South Station, 5th Floor, Boston, Massachusetts 02110 not later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on the dates noted above. One copy of all written comments or petitions to intervene must also be sent to the Companies' attorneys, Melissa G. Liazos, Esq., 40 Sylvan Road, Waltham, Massachusetts 02451 and John Habib, Esq., Keegan Werlin, LLP, 99 High Street, Boston, Massachusetts 02110.

All documents must also be submitted to the Department in electronic format using one of the following methods: (1) by e-mail attachment to dpu.efiling@mass.gov and to Sarah Spruce, Hearing Officer, sarah.spruce@mass.gov; or (2) on a CD-ROM. The text of the e-mail or CD-ROM must specify: (1) the docket number of the proceeding (D.P.U. 19-GREC-03); (2) the name of the person or company submitting the filing; and (3) a brief descriptive title of the document. The electronic filing must also include the name, title, and telephone number of a person to contact in the event of questions about the filing.
